# Rite of Christian Initiation **Holy Baptism**

### Introduction

1. The Sacrament of Baptism is administered by the pouring of water over the candidate as the words "In the name of the Father, and of the Son, and of the Holy Spirit" (the name of the Triune God to whom the candidate is being committed) are spoken (1 Peter 3:21; Matthew 28:19). In baptism the grace of God puts a person's sin to death and brings about a new birth to righteousness, through union with Christ in his death and resurrection. All people are born sinners by nature, separated from God, but in baptism, rightly received, a person is made God's child by grace through faith in Christ (John 3:3-5; Romans 6:1-11; Ephesians 2:12; Galatians 3:27-29). All that is required of a person to be baptized is repentance, in which they turn away from sin; and faith, in which they turn to Jesus Christ as their Savior and Lord and embrace the promises that God makes to them in this sacrament (Acts 2:38).

### **Infant Baptism**

- 2. As Anglicans we baptize infants for the following reasons:
  - a. Under the old covenant infant males were admitted to the family of God at eight days old by the sign of circumcision (Genesis 17:12).
  - b. Baptism, in the new covenant, is the new circumcision (hearts being circumcised) and is how all persons are admitted to Christ's Church (Acts 2:39).
  - c. Infants are to receive baptism under the new covenant just as infants received circumcision under the old covenant. The new covenant is no more restrictive than old covenant.
  - d. Jesus blessed the little children saying that the kingdom of God is theirs (Mark 10:14). In blessing infants Jesus shows that while unconscious of willful sin they are capable of receiving spiritual benefit.
  - e. The grace of God received in the Sacrament of Baptism is made possible because the infant does not yet have the ability to not believe and therefore does not hinder the good will of God by a lack of faith.
- 3. Those who in faith and repentance present infants to be baptized vow to raise them in the knowledge and fear of the Lord, with the expectation that they will one day profess full Christian faith as their own in the Sacrament of Confirmation. The mother and father of an infant to be baptized are to be married and active members of Emmanuel Anglican Church.

### **All Candidates**

4. For both Parents of infant candidates, and Adult Candidates, active membership at Emmanuel Anglican Church is required. The Anglican Church of North America defines active membership in the Duties of the Laity (Anglican Church in North America Constitution & Canons: Title I, Canon 10 §2) which says:

### Members of the Church Commit Themselves to:

- A) To worship God, the Father, and the Son and the Holy Spirit, every Lord's Day in a Church unless reasonably prevented;
- B) To engage regularly in the reading and study of Holy Scripture and the Doctrine of the Church as found in Article I of the Constitution of this Church;
- C) To pray regularly for our needs and those of others, for the Church and its mission, and for the concerns of the world;
- D) To observe our baptismal vows, to lead an upright and sober life, and not give scandal to the Church;
- E) To present our children and those they have led to the Lord for baptism and confirmation;
- F) To give regular financial support to the Church, with the biblical tithe as the minimum standard of giving;
- G) To practice forgiveness daily according to our Lord's teaching;
- H) To receive worthily the Sacrament of Holy Communion as often as reasonable;
- I) To observe the feasts and fasts of the Church set forth in the Anglican formularies;
- J) To affirm and follow the biblical standards of sexual morality and ethics in Canon II.8;
  - 1. Section 1 Clergy and lay leaders of this Church are called to be exemplary in all spheres of morality as a condition of being appointed or remaining in office.
  - 2. Section 2 In view of the teaching of Holy Scripture, the Lambeth Conference of 1998 and the Jerusalem Declaration, this Church upholds faithfulness in marriage between a man and a woman in lifelong union, and believes that abstinence is right for those who are not called to marriage, and cannot legitimize or bless same sex unions or ordain persons who engage in homosexual behavior. Sexual intercourse should take place only between a man and a woman who are married to each other.
  - 3. Section 3 God, and not man, is the creator of human life. The unjustified taking of life is sinful. Therefore, all members and clergy are called to promote and respect the sanctity of every human life from conception to natural death.
- K) To continue our instruction in the Faith so as to remain an effective minister for the Lord Jesus Christ;
- L) To serve our neighbor, sacrificially demonstrating the love of Christ to the poor, the sick and those in need.
- M) To devote ourselves to the ministry of Christ and the proclamation of the Gospel among those who do not know Him, utilizing the gifts that the Holy Spirit gives us, for the effective extension of Christ's Kingdom.

Parents desiring to have their children baptized, and Adult Candidates must commit to honor these duties. Additionally, Parents and Godparents, of both infants and adults, must commit to a three-session baptism preparation class. Adult Candidates are to complete one year of adult catechesis class. Classes must be completed before the baptism takes place. Call the office to register for the appropriate class.

- 5. Holy Baptism is customarily administered on the First Sunday after the Epiphany, at the Easter Vigil, on the Feast of Pentecost, and on All Saints' Day (or the following Sunday). Occasionally, Holy Baptism is administered at other times, depending on the circumstances. Regular participation in the life of the Church is expected of all candidates (as well as their families in the case of infants).
- 6. The Sacrament of Baptism is generally made available only to those persons who regularly attend Emmanuel Anglican Church.

## **Sponsors (Godparents)**

7. Being asked to serve as a baptismal sponsor, or Godparent, is an honor. The sponsor is chosen for a special relationship with the one to be baptized, with the baptizing community, and with God. A decision to accept an invitation to be a sponsor is one that should not be treated lightly and should be discerned prayerfully.

The root of the word sponsor is *spondere*. It means to "promise" — and is also the root of espouse and spouse. In the early days of the Church, when the threat of persecution was often a reality for Christians and there was a fear about spies, sponsors vouched for the candidates to the baptizing community by presenting them and guaranteeing that they were who they said they were. The sponsor stood as a witness to the Christian community that the person seeking baptism was truly desirous of following Christ and of serving and loving God. In addition, sponsors joined their candidates during the days of baptismal preparation. This walking together included praying for the candidates, instructing candidates in the faith, helping candidates understand what they were turning from and toward, and preparing candidates for Christian living in the world. Qualifications for a sponsor include:

- The sponsor must be a baptized Christian. Only a Christian can make the required baptismal renunciations and promises on behalf of the candidate.
- The sponsor should be active in their own spiritual disciplines of prayer, scripture reading and study, stewardship (godly use of time, talent, and treasure), and regular attendance in their home church.
- The sponsor is willing to commit themselves to a lifelong relationship with their candidate.

\*While it is not required, it is strongly encouraged, that sponsors be members of the church where the candidate will also be a member Emmanuel Anglican Church.

It is expected that the sponsor will:

- Cultivate a personal relationship with the candidate.
- Represent Christ and the Church to the candidate before and after the baptism.
- Set an example of Christian life discipleship for the candidate.
- Commit to regular prayer for the candidate before and after the baptism.

### How Can a Sponsor Prepare?

- Review the Baptismal Liturgy.
- If geographically reasonable, attend baptism preparation sessions with the candidate and parents in the case of infants.
- Be willing to explore questions, issues, and expectations around baptism with the candidate, a member of the clergy, and/or the family.
- Pray for the members of the baptismal party, especially the candidate, that they might approach the sacrament with reverence and thanksgiving.
  - O God, you prepared your disciples for the coming of the Spirit through the teaching of your Son Jesus Christ: Make the hearts and minds of your servants ready to receive the blessing of the Holy Spirit, that they may be filled with the strength of his presence: through Jesus Christ our Lord. Amen.

### How Can a Sponsor Be Involved with Their Candidate?

- Remember the anniversary of the baptism through a card, letter, phone call or visit.
- Note the candidate's major life events in a Christian manner (birthdays, graduations, marriage, birth of children, illness, bereavement).
- Attend worship services with the candidate.
- Express an interest in what the candidate is learning and experiencing in Sunday School/Christian Education, discipleship classes, or in other settings of religious education.
- Personally help the candidate learn the basics of Christian worship and practice (Lord's Prayer, Apostles' Creed, Nicene Creed, the Ten Commandments, the promises of the Baptismal Covenant).
- Discuss, read, and study the Bible with the candidate so they develop a knowledge and understanding of the scriptures.
- Share your own spiritual journey and experiences (testimonies) with the candidate.
- Be present with the candidate when they make a mature affirmation of the Christian faith in the presence of a bishop in the Sacrament of Confirmation.
